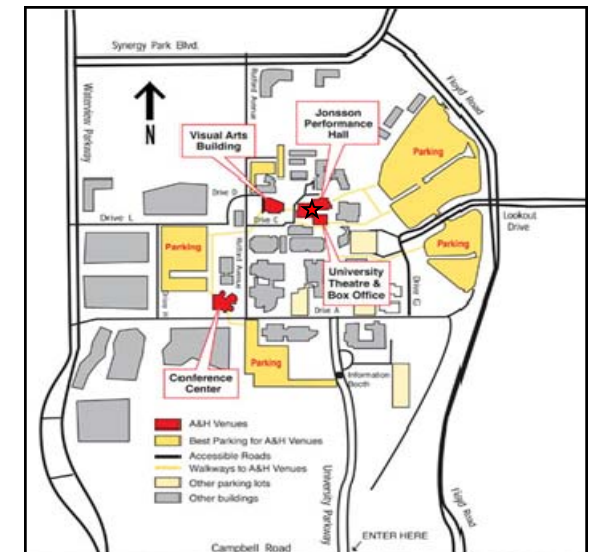
Since these workshops are free, registration is required and participants are encouraged to register early, for either one or all workshops at the same time since seating is limited.

About the Workshops

The Confucius Institute at the University of Texas at Dallas, the National Consortium for Teaching about Asia, the Freeman Foundation, and the University of North Texas are pleased to present five exciting, **FREE** workshops for teachers on a variety of topics discussing East Asia in the fall of 2009.



Korea and China: A Cultural Relationship

Dr. Timothy Lee, an ordained minister of the Christian Church and holder of a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago, is a scholar of Korean church history. He currently teaches courses on Christian history, and particularly on Asian and Asian-American Christian history, at Texas Christian University. For this workshop, Dr. Lee will give us a basic introduction to pre-modern Korea and its interaction with China, with an emphasis on political-religious issues.

Chinese Culture and Transformation of Japan: Early Japan to the Heian Period

Dr. Andrew Hall's research on Japanese colonial policies in Manchuria gives him extensive knowledge and experience in both Japan, his primary area of interest, and in China. He teaches courses on Japanese, East Asian, and world history at the University of North Texas. In this session, he will focus on the intersection of Chinese, Korean, and Japanese culture in Japan and how that interaction enriched the Japanese culture of the Heian period—the great age of Lady Murasaki's Tale of Genji.

China and Chinese Culture in the Land of the Samurai

Dr. Paul Clark teaches courses related to East Asia—in particular China and Japan—at West Texas A&M University. His interests include Japanese language history, pre-war Japanese education, and the history of Japanese identity and nationalism. Dr. Clark's topic for this workshop will be Japan during the age of the samurai.
